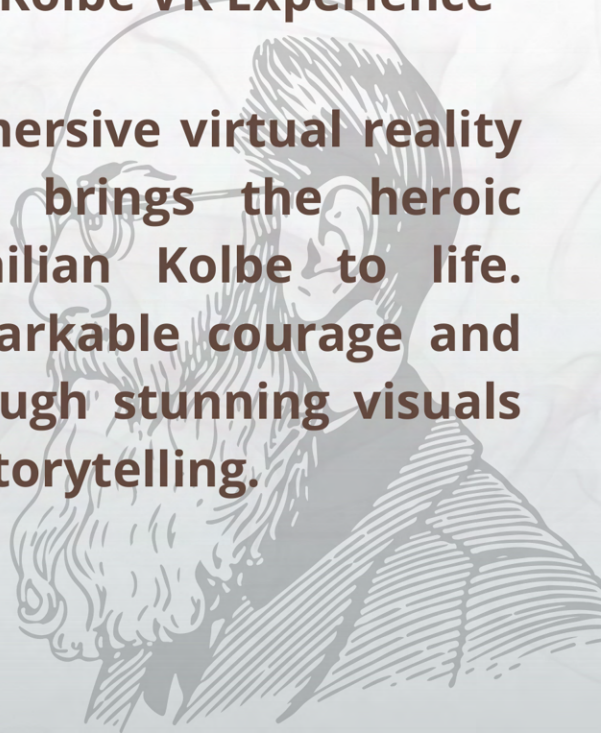

Maksymilian Kolbe

Makymilian Kolbe, a Polish Franciscan friar, is remembered as a beacon of selfless love and courage.

Born in 1894, his life was marked by a deep faith and a tireless commitment to serving others.



During World War II, he was imprisoned in the notorious Auschwitz concentration camp, where his ultimate act of sacrifice—offering his life in place of another prisoner—etched his name into the annals of history. Kolbe's legacy continues to inspire, reminding us of the profound impact of compassion and altruism even in the darkest times.

Facts about Maksymilian Kolbe



Vision of the Virgin Mary: At the age of 12, Maximilian Kolbe had a vision of the Virgin Mary. He later said that she offered him two crowns: one white, symbolizing purity, and one red, symbolizing martyrdom. He chose both, indicating his willingness to pursue both a life of purity and one of martyrdom.

Radio Operator: Kolbe was a pioneer in using media for evangelization. He founded the "Militia Immaculatae" (Army of the Immaculate) and used radio broadcasts to spread Christian messages. He even held an amateur radio license.

Publishing Empire: Kolbe established a major Catholic publication center in Niepokalanów, near Warsaw, which became one of the largest monasteries in the world. It included a printing press, a radio station, and various other media ventures to spread religious teachings.

Missionary Work: Before World War II, Kolbe spent several years in Japan as a missionary. He founded a monastery in Nagasaki, which remarkably survived the atomic bombing of the city during World War II due to its location on the opposite side of the valley from the blast.

Acts of Heroism: During his time in Auschwitz, Kolbe volunteered to take the place of Franciszek Gajowniczek, a fellow prisoner who had a family. This selfless act led to his death in a starvation bunker, where he continued to comfort and support his fellow inmates until his last breath.

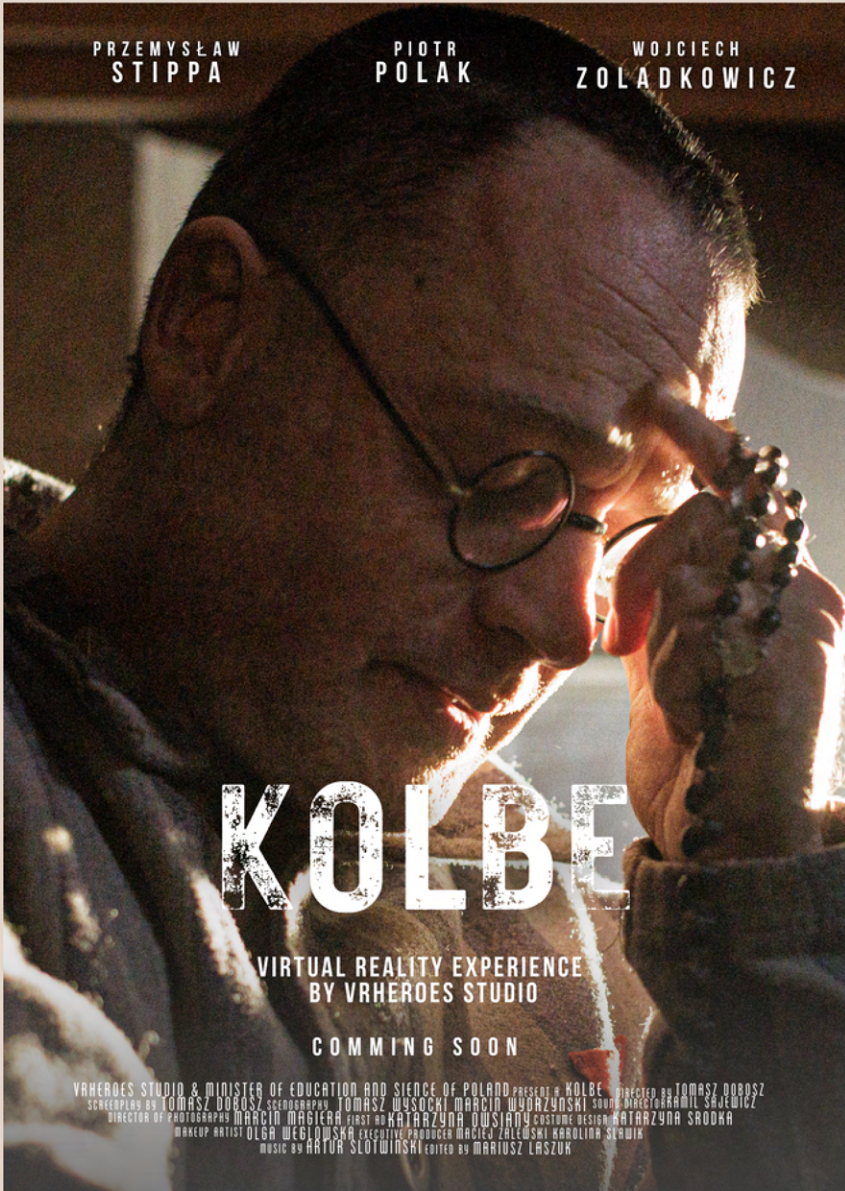
Most Memorable Impressions

This is a story everyone should experience, if only for the powerful emotions that accompany it from the very first minute of the film.

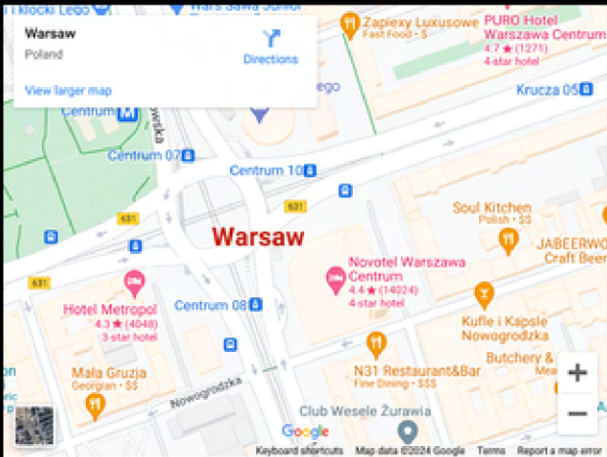
